

GRADUATE SCHOOL ADMISSIONS ROADMAP

1 Research

6+ months before applying

- Determine what you want to study and for how long you want to go to graduate school
- Understand the differences between master's, professional and doctoral programs
- Get a sense of your career options and earning potential with a specific graduate degree
- Register for FAFSA and start looking into scholarship and grant applications
- Start to create a long list of disciplines and programs that interest you; use program websites to help you get started, request brochures and attend live or virtual open house events for programs that interest you
- Look into the credentials of those admitted to determine if you are a competitive candidate
- Think about geographic preferences
- More considerations: curriculum, competitiveness, cost, reputation, public vs private school, research/internship opportunities
- Talk to friends and family for their perspective; speak with current students or alumni of programs you are interested in wherever possible
- Hone your list of schools/programs
- Start thinking about when you will study for and take the GRE®

2 Prepare for the GRE

3-6 months before applying

- Decide when you want to take the test _____ (Date)
- Allow yourself 3 months prior to your test date to prepare
- Take a free, realistic, full-length practice test with Kaplan

3 The Application Process—Part I

At least 3 months before applications are due

- Create a schedule of deadlines, including application deadlines, financial aid deadlines and test registration dates
- Think about appropriate people to write recommendations and contact each with the deadline for submitting references
- Begin crafting your personal statement
- Complete and submit your online applications
- Follow the application directions explicitly, and have someone familiar with you (and the application process) review your application before submitting
- Wait for graduate and business schools to contact you about interviews

4 The Application Process—Part II

After your application(s) have been submitted

- Prepare for your interviews
- Wait for acceptance letters
- Investigate all needs-based financial aid options to supplement merit-based aid
- If you are waitlisted, be patient; let the program(s) know that you are still interested in admission and continue to engage in activities that enhance your application

The GRE was completely revised in August 2011. The new GRE takes about 4 hours to complete and includes challenging Quantitative and Verbal Reasoning content and question types.

Quantitative Sections (2)	about 20 per section	35 mins per section	Quantitative Comparison, Problem Solving, Data Interpretation
Verbal Sections (2)	about 20 per section	35 mins per section	Text Completion, Sentence Equivalence, Reading Comprehension
